






Dance No 2°, the second major work from **Sivan Rubinstein** following the success of *MAPS*, responds to the reality of our planet, examining our bodies' relationship with it.

It is a timeless dance, using ancient images of evolution and prophetic visions of the future to explore cycles of changing climates. It examines how human existence is influenced by the land and elements we live with. All the senses are mobilised as we explore how to become a part of the natural world and where our place is within a fragile ecosystem.

Transported by a cinematic soundtrack, earth-toned costumes and a minimalist set, audiences journey from the desert to the sea to scenes of protest, understanding how the land we live on and the planet we inhabit shapes us, how our body can be a planet, and the planet our home.

'In a world of growing division and displacement prompted by conflict, climate crisis, and injustice, can we find hope and common ground in conceptions of 'home' and in attachments to place? As a new generation leads the way in finding spaces of resistance and modes of solidarity, we want to explore what happens when we put the human body and embodied experiences at the centre of our enquiry'

## **ABOUT THE ARTIST**



Sivan Rubinstein is a London-based choreographer whose art uncovers contemporary cultural issues which facilitate creative public conversations. Her work is deeply rooted in collaboration with academics, artists, communities and methods of alternative learning. Sivan is a Work Place artist (2021-26), Artist in Residence at King's College London (2019-20) and a Co-founder of OH Creative Space. Sivan was chosen as the UK artist for Pivot Dance commissioned by Creative Europe, selected by The Place for Exit Visa, right after she graduated from Trinity Laban with a First-Class Honours in 2013. Her work has been presented at Bloomsbury Festival (Wellcome Collection, London), Being Human Festival (London), Sotheby's, Sadler's Wells, Migration Museum, The Place, JW3 (London), Turner Contemporary (Margate), Dance 4 & The Attenborough Arts Centre (Midlands), European Dancehouse Network, B. Motion Festival, (Italy), The Dutch Dance Festival (Netherlands) and the 2019 YAP Residency Program in Beijing, China. Sivan also shares her practice in academic conferences, teaches in university settings across the UK and creates new ways of collaborating with multimedia, fashion artists and researchers.

### **Key Selling Points**

### **Audience Development**

- Academic audiences from Dance, Philosophy and Geography subjects: university students, dance practitioners and lecturers from dance and humanities. Workshops are available to supplement the learning offer.
- World Music enthusiasts: original music composed by Liran Donin, combines ambient sounds with middle eastern rhythms.
- Activists and people engaged in the climate emergency cause, such as Extinction Rebellion or followers of Greta Thunberg and local climate activist groups.
- Audience Development opportunities exist with young Eco-Activists, with a focus on engaging Gen Z audiences (under 25) both new to and familiar with dance with topical themes and a strong visual language highly suited to digital platforms and social media.

# **SOCIALLY ENGAGED PROJECTS**

Originally stemming from a year-long residency with Kings College London, Sivan has developed two projects:

# Z, a digital Participatory Journey - aimed at young people aged 12-25yrs

Over 5 in person or online sessions Sivan supports participants to make links between Climate activism and dance.

The young people are guided through a series of visual offers, physical activities and conversations around themes, including:

- The body as a planet
- · Harmony and Disruption of weather
- Pollution and Migration
- Right here right now

Participants are invited to create video reflections inspired by these themes.

## Z 2° alpha - open to all

A contextual one-off event this participatory performance, invites the audience to take place in the journey of *Dance No 2*°.

These participation offers explore the physical and visceral experiences of Climate Crisis. These contextual projects are offered as complimentary events to enhance the *Dance No 2*°.

# **TECHNICAL SPECS**

Dance No 2° has been created to the following technical specifications and responds to the need for socially distanced performances. **Sivan Rubinstein's** artistic approach and the organic nature of the piece allows for Dance No 2° to be easily adapted for any space or setting. Duration	60 mins
Performance Space	Clear space of 14m wide x 11m deep, without masking.
Get In	A full day, performance on the following day.
Get Out	2 hours following the show.
Set	Provided by venue: 6 decking platforms of different heights with legs and swivel clamps, White PVC tape for floor, 5 2mx13m white dance floor, 10 yoga mats for cushioning deck surfaces.
	Touring with company: 2 mirror gels in frames (1mx1m), one is used at stage level on a freestanding base, one is to be rigged overhead (<1kg), 5 Wooden OSB Boards to be clamped to deck, 2 large tree branches (approx. 4m each)
Warm-Up Space	A separate warm-up space is required.
Lighting	A generic LX plan with lantern counts can be found in our technical folder.  Notable lantern requirements: 8x 2K Fresnels, 4x 50deg profiles, 1x 4-cell ground row.
Sound	Original music, playback only, operated through Qlab.
Projector	Projector needed, to be rigged for projection on the white floor.
Touring party of 6	4 dancers, 1 Choreographer, 1 Touring Technician.
UKBA	All dancers have the right to work in the UK.
